Neil Schaner



Neil Schaner crossed over to Troop 22 from Pack 11 in 1997. He then became a member of the Badger Patrol for four years. Neil served as the Badger's Patrol Leader before taking the Assistant Patrol Leader position next to Graham Eckert in the Cobra Patrol. After one year of working with the new Scouts, Neil moved to senior leadership to become an Assistant Senior Patrol Leader. Recently Neil has served as a Junior Assistant Scoutmaster and is currently an Assistant Scoutmaster. Since joining the Troop, Neil has accumulated over 150 nights of camping and over 200 hours of community service, has placed third, second, and first in the Klondike with different patrols, and has been elected to the Order of the Arrow. Neil has enjoyed going on High Adventure outings to Algonquin Provincial Park and Isle Royale National Park along with seven summer camps.

Neil's Eagle Project took place at Church of the Saviour on Lee Road. After discussions on what needed to be done on church grounds and in the basement, the Scouts got to work. The outside phase of the project included replanting terraced areas, removing weeds, and sprucing up a pre-school playground. Inside, the project continued with the renovation of a theatre storage room and the painting of an organ motor.

Neil has recently graduated from Cleveland Heights High School after a busy year. Neil was a member of the National Honor Society, Heights Symphony, Brass Choir, Marching Band, Jazz Band, and Varsity Swim Team. Currently, Neil works as a lifeguard at Cumberland Pool. Neil will study mechanical engineering this fall at the University of Cincinnati on several engineering scholarships.

Myles Murray



Myles was born on the eve of the Ides of March in 1986. He moved into Cleveland Heights when he was four. Starting at Roxboro elementary school in Cub Scout Pack 4 as a Webelo, he continued on to Roxboro middle where he joined Boy Scout Troop 22. At age 13 he became assistant Patrol leader of the Sharks, then Patrol leader of the same. Later he was troop scribe, Patrol leader of the Dragon Slayers, and a Junior Assistant Scoutmaster.

At Cleveland Heights High School Myles was an athlete and a scholar. He ran three years with the cross-country team. He was a four-year member of the Swim Team, spending one year as a captain and earning an all league title. Myles was a member of the National Honor Society, the French Club, and president of the Political Awareness Club and spent eight semesters on Honor roll. He placed in the National Chemistry Olympiad and won the school's Shakespeare Contest.

Outside school Myles has been very involved in anti-war activism through the Not in Our Name (NION) group. He led a walkout from the school the day after the war started, and organized several other antiwar actions on campus. He also spoke at rallies and marches in Cleveland. With help from the Political Awareness Club he organized a Nine Million Dollar Bake sale as a media event to raise support for the CH-UH levy.

This fall Myles will be attending Hendrix College, in Arkansas, on a full tuition Provost scholarship. He intends to study Politics and Chemistry, to learn a lot and to have fun.

Spencer Kohan



Spencer Kohan has lived in Cleveland Heights his entire life, where he has studied in the public schools. Spencer has been particularly active in the area of music. He has been playing Saxophone since the fourth grade. Over the years he has been a member of the Heights Symphonic Band, Heights Symphonic Winds, Heights High Jazz Lab Band, The heights High Jazz Ensemble and Combo, and the Fairfax Elementary Recorder Ensemble.

After crossing over from pack eleven, Spencer spent several years having a blast in the Badger Patrol. After this, he spent a year as the Patrol Leader of the Raptors, and then a year as the troop's Scribe. He spent the remaining months before his eighteenth birthday as a Junior Assistant Scout Master. Spencer has received the 150/50 award (for over 150 nights of camping and over 50 hours of service) and attended three high adventure trips. For his Eagle project Spencer mobilized a team of scouts and other volunteers to clean up Gordon Park on the Cleveland waterfront. The crew liberated over thirty bags of garbage and two car tires from the park.

Next year Spencer will attend the Ohio State University honors college on a University Scholarship and an award from the Ohio Board of Regents.

Spencer would like to thank all of his friends, family, teachers and scoutmasters for their continuous support and guidance over the years. He would like particularly to thank his peers in the troop for making scouting fun and rewarding enough to keep him active in the troop long enough for him to earn this award.



Graham Eckert

Graham Eckert has been active in the troop since 1997. After advancing from Pack 4 into Troop 22, Graham spent many years in the fledging Wolf Patrol, serving as Troop Scribe for one year. He then joined the newly formed Cobras as Patrol Leader. Along with Assistant Patrol Leader Neil Schaner, they placed third in the Klondike. Graham then led the troop for one year as Senior Patrol Leader. For the past year, he has served as a Junior Assistant Scoutmaster. His Eagle project was the collection of books for Third World Books, a local organization committed to literacy in Africa. The books were shipped to Uganda.

Outside of Scouting, Graham has also held positions of responsibility in the community and at Cleveland Heights High School. He led *The Black & Gold* at Heights for two years as Editor-in-Chief, was active on student council for four years, spending one as the President of the Class of 2004 and another as Vice President of Student Council for Grievances, and was President of the Forensics Club for two years. Graham also served as captain of the Cross-Country team for two years, where he earned Varsity letters in Cross-Country and Track & Field. He was also active in French Club, Key Club, and the Instrumental Music Department, where he served as Webmaster and Recording Staff Head, while playing the flute for three years.

Graham has spent summers as a Campaign Coordinator at the Ohio Public Interest Research Group and working in the Dr. George Dubyak laboratory at Case Western Reserve University, studying cell signaling and inflammation. He also organized a student campaign for the May 2003 CH-UH City School District levy.
